

Community Needs Assessment Early Childhood Development

UNMET COMMUNITY NEEDS AND BARRIERS

- 1. Leader/Convener to Facilitate Cross Organization Planning
 - a. No dialogue across various island communities and among community organizations regarding total Orcas population needs.
 - b. No source of leadership and institutional memory to provide consistency across the years for collaboration successes/failures & ideas.
 - c. A solid business plan to build community support for a family resource center and other funding to support the above.
 - d. Limited time/resources for collaboration between Readiness to Learn and Orcas Family Connections
- 2. Centralized Place & Resources for Family Collaboration, Information & Support
 - a. Parent isolation no central place for parent information, gathering & sharing. Need for parenting group organization and coordination.
 - b. Limited help for families in accessing and applying for subsidies & other government programs. No easy way to identify and greet new residents to help with needs.
 - c. No central outreach to new island families. ("Child Find"-like service not available on Orcas)
 - d. Lack of support groups and respite support for families with special needs, grandparents as primary care givers, etc.
 - e. Limited information for "is this normal" questions and answers. Need a central place and resources to help with organization/coordination of collaboration opportunities for early childhood resources, medical personnel, parent groups, etc.
- 3. Program Limitations.
 - a. Space limitations within current Early Childcare programs waiting lists.
 - b. No source of childcare for weekends & evenings to support working parents with non-standard hours.
 - c. Lack of sick child centers for working parents.
 - d. Need for a developmental kindergarten (pre-K preparation).

4. Missing Services

- a. No clothing or child gear bank for clothing/supplying families. Exchange with very limited hours and items.
- b. Limited child development testing & information prior to kindergarten.
- c. Non-existent birth to 3 year parent education & support for all.
- d. No subsidized/free legal assistance for families with child-related (and other) issues.

- e. No funding for medical translation.
- f. Lack of transportation for Early Childhood programs & medical care.
- g. No emergency shelter for families beyond immediate DVSAS. Rise in teen pregnancy with no resources to support them with preparation and parenting.
- h. No local training for early childhood educational training. No Spanish classes for childcare educators.

5. Limited Funding

- a. Limited emergency funds for health, dental, etc. for children.
- b. No single source of preschool scholarship funds/tuition assistance making cost an issue in preschool education and option of school.
- c. No multi-year funding for preschool/childcare scholarships for program consistency planning for centers and families.
- d. Increasing State training requirements for early childhood teaching without commensurate reimbursement for training expenses (mandated but not funded requirements), especially for extra travel expenses because of our remote location. On-line training limited in value.
- e. Limited/non-existent federal funds to support birth to 3 year programs (e.g., Early ECEAP or Head Start under 3 year funding)
- f. No funding to pay for the time for teachers & others to participate with collaboration activities to avoid direct impact to paychecks for missed work hours.
- g. Insufficient funds to continue collaboration programs with other community organizations (i.e., Chamber Music funding early childhood music, etc.)
- h. Limited funding for Orcas Family Connections.

6. Other Issues

- a. All of the above family challenges multiplied for Spanish-speaking population due to language and cultural barriers.
- b. Biases among some families for childhood collaboration across centers (social, language, etc.)

WHAT CHANGES MIGHT IMPACT YOUR ORGANIZATION?

- 1. Funding decreases as a result of the economy or other governmental priorities. Decreases in:
 - a. Government programs & subsidies (WIC, childcare subsidies, ITEP, MSS, Basic Health, etc.)
 - b. Donor funding
 - c. Grant opportunities
- 2. Financial hardships of families increasing the need for scholarships, support services, etc. that require public/private funding and coordination.
- 3. Demographic changes:
 - a. Increasing Spanish-speaking population.
 - b. Young families forced to leave the island due to lack of income sources (jobs) and cost of living
 - c. Other families moving to the island with significant needs
 - d. Telecommuting parents with different childcare needs/hours
- 4. ECEAP slots increase or decrease.
- 5. Potential government mandates for early childhood or other infant/child programs (funded or unfunded)
- 6. Changes in funding for all day kindergarten.
- 7. Administrative support sharing or other collaborative/sharing funding/opportunities.

GREATEST LEARNINGS FROM THIS COLLABORATION MEETING

- 1. Tremendous amount of caring, expertise & energy within the group to tackle the challenges.
- 2. Many possibilities to explore.
- 3. There is a great need for funding for further collaboration and a sharing for work savings for all organizations:
 - a. Centralized facility
 - b. Paid coordinator
 - c. Centralized information
- 4. Need more meetings continued collaboration, larger collaborative effort.
- 5. The amazing level of evolution of childcare/preschool sharing and collaboration over the last several years.
- 6. Opportunities exist for Board collaboration for more progress and ideas.
- 7. Participants in the Needs Assessment have multiple disciplinary backgrounds and are able to look beyond their own organizations/jobs to focus on what is best for the community.
- 8. There is a future need for measuring progress in early childhood development programs and collaborative initiatives.
- 9. It will take a long time.
